A Note From Jeff Kleiner, NHBUA Supervisor of Umpires

Mechanics Points of Emphasis

Fly Ball Focus

One of the hardest and most frequent responsibilities we have is reading fly balls and deciding whether to go out. Often, when we make the incorrect decision, it is because we do not take the adequate amount of time to process all the factors involved in determining our action. General guidelines for this process are as follows:

1. Understand instances of trouble, to include:

a. Fair and foul decisions, including fielders moving toward the line aggressively

b. Fielders moving straight in or straight back aggressively (catch below the waste or a dive)

c. Converging fielders

d. Fly balls challenging the fence, possibly leaving the field in flight or on a bounce

e. Adverse weather conditions such as wind, rain, or sun

f. Note: The ability of an umpire to go out and standard for trouble may be altered/limited by the umpire system or starting position on the field of the calling umpire (such as not leaving the infield in the two-umpire system, among others).

2. Pause and identify if a fly ball is clearly within our specific fly ball coverage area, clearly in our partner's area, or in a coverage area where multiple umpires share fly ball coverage responsibilities. This determination will dictate our next movement, depending on the umpire system. Note: Identifying the position of fielder pre-pitch can aid this process.





3. Pause and read your partner. If the ball is in a possible shared coverage area and once it is determined fly ball responsibility is yours, subsequently, read the movements and actions of the fielders in the vicinity of the ball. It is recommended umpires engage in this part of the process from a stopped position, opened to the fielders, commonly known as a read-step, while giving significantly more attention to the actions of the fielders, rather than the flight of the ball.

4. React to the fielder's movements. If you make the decision not to go out, continue through the mechanics of the system maintaining or passing off fly ball coverage as defined in this manual. If you make the decision to go out:

a. Communicate your actions verbally ("I'm out") and/or nonverbally (turning your back and running to the outfield) to your partner.

b. Move into the best position to rule on the catch/no-catch. Broadly, optimal positioning will put the umpire "in the window" to view all elements of the catch including the ball entering the glove. Movements shall be under control to allow umpires to stop timely.

c. Set before any critical action of the ball or fielders occurs. Priority should be placed on being set for this type of play, rather than advancing an additional step or two (commonly branded "move as far as the play will allow"). Umpires should remain in an athletic position while observing this action should subsequent movement be necessary.

d. Finish the elements of the play. Umpires should not take their eyes of a catch determination until all elements of a rule book defined catch have been satisfied.

e. Signal your determination of the play, understanding your back is often to the playing field and press box in these scenarios. While engaging in this process, focus on making safe reads on fly balls. Understanding this process will never be perfect, erring on the side of "going out" and having an umpire out for a routine catch is preferable to fielders diving and crashing with no umpire in the outfield.





Be Stopped and Still for Force Plays

In order for an umpire to increase his odds for getting a force play correct, it is best if he is in the optimal position to view the play. He must be stopped and still.

While many umpires are programed to be making moves or adjustments as tag plays evolve, force plays are best judged from a totally stopped and still position. On force plays the umpire moves quickly to the best position, and stops and faces the base after the throw is released. It is recommended that once the umpire is in his final position and facing the base, he remains still and focuses on the play.

Many umpires ask if they need to go set at first base. It is no longer mandatory for an umpire to assume a down position like a scissors or "hands on knees" set. On plays at first base where the play seems routine, a hands on knees set is usually okay. Occasionally, the umpire may see a play that is not routine, such as a likely pulled foot or the fielder having to come off the base to tag the runner. For these non-routine plays it is far easier to make adjustments from a standing set. At second base force plays, umpires should remain in a standing set-not going hands on knees.







Character and Conduct

Character

Umpires are expected to exhibit and uphold the standards of integrity of the umpiring profession. The image of an umpire demands honesty and high ethical standards. Umpires should make every decision based on the circumstances and facts presented, regardless of an umpire's past history with a particular player or team. No umpire should ever threaten a player, coach or team with future retaliation.

1. Realize the importance of your position and at all times uphold the dignity it demands.

2. Never be jealous of a good break another umpire gets. Your turn may be next.

3. Never use your senior position to embarrass a partner.

4. Be receptive. Open your mind to new concepts and ideas.

5. Be honest with yourself. Unreal expectations place an extra burden on an already intense job.

6. Become a leader. If you adopt a philosophy that you're going to help others reach their goals, you will reach yours.

7. Be passionate. If you're passionate about integrity, honesty and professionalism, you've improved your quality of life through umpiring.

8. Be courageous. Doing what is right and defendable — versus what's popular or safe — takes strong will and conviction.

9. Be aware that perception of you and umpiring can be just as important as ability, and is developed by conduct and actions on and off the field.

10. Enjoy and have fun in your position.







Conduct and Ethics

1. Umpires shall bear a great responsibility for engendering public confidence in sports.

2. Umpires shall be free of obligation to any interest other than the impartial and fair judging of sports competitions.

3. Umpires shall hold and maintain the basic tenets of officiating which include history, integrity, neutrality, respect, sensitivity, professionalism, discretion and tactfulness.

4. Umpires shall master both the rules of the game and mechanics necessary to enforce the rules, and shall exercise authority in an impartial, firm and controlled manner.

5. Umpires shall uphold the honor and dignity of the profession in all interactions with student-athletes, coaches, school administrators, colleagues and the public.

6. Umpires shall display and execute superior communication skills, both verbal and non-verbal.

7. Umpires shall prepare themselves both physically and mentally and shall comport themselves in a manner consistent with the high standards of the profession.

8. Umpires shall not be party to actions designed to unfairly limit or restrain access to officiating, officiating assignments or to association membership. This includes selection for positions of leadership based upon economic factors, race, creed, color, age, sex, physical handicap, country or national origin.

9. Umpires shall be punctual and professional in the fulfillment of all contractual obligations.

10. Umpires shall work with each other and their governing bodies in a constructive and cooperative manner.

11. Umpires shall not make false or misleading statements regarding their qualifications, rating, credentials, experience, training or competence.

12. Umpires shall accept responsibility for all actions taken.





Coach/Umpire Philosophy

While head coaches will still sometimes cross the line when it comes to the interactions with an umpire during a situation, it is imperative that an umpire be the calming influence as opposed to being out of control. Even if a coach goes ballistic, an umpire is expected to remain professional in his actions. By doing that, and by requesting the same actions from an upset coach, the umpire will diffuse a situation quicker and the game can resume. While most umpires are aware of their role and responsibility in dealing with confrontational situations, there is still improvement to be made.

• Stay Calm

Nothing good can happen when you are just as upset in a discussion as a coach. Coaches are emotionally involved; some are fighting for their jobs and livelihood every game of every season. That is rarely true for an umpire. When umpires lose their composure, they have forgotten their role is to manage the game and the situations that arise.

• Watch What You Say, Where You Say It

There is simply no defense for using improper language, whether on the field, in the locker room or anywhere that someone from a team can hear you. You never know who listening or when a recording is being made. Even in a casual postgame conversation, you need to keep it clean and don't make any statement that can be used against you.







General Principles & Guidelines

Style and Form of Calls

Umpires may have individual mechanics in style and it is recognized that the individual styles of umpires have evolved over a number of years. However, certain fundamentals should be evident in signals and calls.

1. Umpires shall make a signal on all calls with the exception of ball and an obvious catch of a fly ball. Signals are to be visible, crisp and clear. Voice calls should be clearly audible.

2. All signals should project decisiveness to the teams, fans and media. Signals should not be slow to the point of appearing uncertain or causing confusion for the participants, fans or media.

3. Umpires are expected to increase the assertiveness of their call signal and voice as the play becomes closer. A casual, laid-back signal is not appropriate in a crucial, close play. However, overelaborate, excessive signals are not an acceptable technique either.

4. Umpires should strive to see all plays with body and head in a stable position, not on the move. Whenever possible, a call should be completed in its entirety prior to turning or moving to another position.

Handling Situations

Umpires must walk a fine line between keeping the game under control and not exacerbating situations with over-aggressive or arrogant actions. Although every situation is unique, umpires on the field should follow the guidelines below:

- 1. Umpires should remain calm, professional, tactful, firm, in control, fair and impartial. They cannot be perceived as overly aggressive, confrontational, hotheaded, short-tempered, timid, intimidated or nervous. Umpires must never display impatience or a condescending attitude
- 2. Umpires are expected to understand their role as a steady, calming influence on the game. Umpires must be able to sort out complex and important situations and cannot be hesitant to make unpopular decisions.
- 3. Umpires should never ignore occurrences on the field that require their attention to maintain order and control. But when difficult situations arise, it is essential that umpires stay above the emotional fray and never lower themselves to the





excitable level of a particular player or coach. Umpires must be clear and decisive, while not overly aggressive or overbearing. They are expected to become more assertive if the situation calls for such, but must control their temper at all times. All in all, umpires must calm volatile situations while keeping control and managing them.

- 4. Umpires should listen to head coaches if discussions are reasonable and nonemotional. Correct body language is critical during any discussion. Umpires are to be firm and authoritative in conversations with head coaches — but should never initiate an argument. Umpires must not create unnecessary friction by ignoring reasonable inquiries. At the same time, umpires must command respect during difficult situations and never tolerate personal abuse.
- 5. Umpires must avoid sarcastic remarks and profanity and not insist on the last word. The NHBUA, NHIAA and NFHS code of conduct will not tolerate umpires' language, which, if used by a player or coach toward an umpire, would result in discipline.
- 6. Umpires must not charge a player or coach or follow them if the argument is over and they are walking away. Umpires cannot look for trouble or invite arguments. If a situation can defuse itself, umpires must allow it to happen. Umpires must not be perceived as having escalated a situation.
- Umpires must not initiate contact with a player or coach. Initiating contact, including "bumping" and physical finger pointing, will subject umpires to disciplinary action.







Basic Umpiring Guidelines

Mechanics Philosophies/Basic Concepts

A. Umpire mechanics are a series of compromises.

B. Base coverage and mechanics are based on the most likely play to happen next.

C. Mechanics should not be based on unlikely second or third play developments.

D. Mechanics should not be based on limiting the amount of effort an umpire must exert.

E. The crew needs to work together to cover the entire field of play without limiting the workload of any one umpire.

F. Umpires must be able to read batted balls and runners and be able to react appropriately with correct mechanics.

G. While fair/foul and catch/no catch are the first things that can happen on a play, those calls do not automatically call for an umpire to leave their position. On plays that will be extremely close, the umpire should go out to rule.

H. High School umpires do not work an entire season with the same partner and therefore mechanics must be consistent from crew to crew across the state.

I. Crew communication before every new hitter and during play situations is critical.

J. Umpires should regularly glance at their partners to assure expected movement and coverage.







Basic Starting Positions

"A" - in foul territory behind first base

"B" – within the infield, half the distance between the pitcher's rubber and first base and half the distance between the pitcher's rubber and second base.

"Deep B" – along the grass dirt line on the first-base side of second base.

"C" – within the infield, half the distance between the pitcher's rubber and third base and half the distance between the pitcher's rubber and second base.

"Deep C" – along the grass dirt line on the third-base side of second base.

General Balk Responsibilities

A. All umpires should intently watch for all actions that could cause a balk.

B. If you see a balk, you should call it immediately regardless of your position on the field.

C. Other umpires should mirror the balk call of their partners to ensure everyone on the field is clear that a balk has been called. (If a coach comes out to argue the call, the umpire that had the balk should walk toward the coach and explain the call.)

D. There are some balks that are more obvious from some positions (see specific crew sections for details).

Rundown Plays

All umpires must work to get good angles on run down plays and not get straight lined on the tag. In general, the umpire that has the clearest view of the tag should take the initiative on making the call. Good eye contact between partners is essential.







Positioning for Taking Plays

The illustrations shown in this manual do not depict actual positions for umpires as plays develop. The illustrations do show the bases for which each umpire is responsible in given situations. Due to the numerous complex possibilities of plays at each base and the plate, umpires are given flexibility to take plays from a position that they deem to be most advantageous without taking themselves out of position for a possible next play.

Crew Pregame Meeting

The crew chief or plate umpire should conduct a thorough pregame meeting before each game. There should also be a post-game debriefing during which unusual plays, unusual situations, crew self-evaluation and game assessment takes place. An outline of what should be covered in the pregame meeting includes:

Pregame Conference Outline

- 1. Notify home school that the crew has arrived
- 2. Confirm start time
- 3. Discussion topics
 - a. Uniforms
 - b. Positioning / Coverages
 - c. Check swing responsibilities and mechanics
 - d. Swipe tag and pulled foot mechanics
 - e. Fair/foul responsibilities
 - f. Outfield coverage
 - g. Points of emphasis
- 4. Pregame/Plate Conference
 - a. Ground rules by home coach
 - b. PU does all talking unless otherwise directed
 - c. Run to positions







- 5. Non-verbal signals
 - a. Infield fly
 - b. Standard rotation
 - c. Reverse rotation
 - d. Umpire going out
 - e. Appeal
 - f. Time Play
 - g. Trap/catch by catcher on third strike
 - h. Outs and count
 - i. Eye contact
- 11. Appeals: base touches and tag ups
- 12. Closing
 - a. Rule or mechanics questions
 - b. Hustle at all times
 - c. Communicate
 - d. Good eye contact
 - e. Good timing
 - f. Get plays right
 - g. Have fun and enjoy what you are doing





Taking Plays at Home Plate

A lot of umpires are moving and not getting set for plays at home plate.

Umpires should be able to make slight movements and adjustments on plays at the plate to see all critical elements of the play. Picking one spot to see a play often is not the best spot to see those critical elements as the play unfolds; it is very important for umpires to be under control when necessary movements are needed. Controlled movements and getting set on plays is very important but picking one spot to see a play often times is not the best spot to see those critical elements as the play unfolds. If an umpire chooses the wrong spot, is blocked out, or does not make proper adjustments as the play develops, that umpire reduces his chances of getting that call right.

Being closer to tag plays at the plate, working off the catcher's hip, finding the window, and making late adjustments are all very important factors that need to be considered when getting in the best position to get tag plays correct.

Going to one spot and stopping is not a good habit. Generally speaking, on a throw from the outfield, the umpire should read a play at the plate from the point of the plate as a starting position and after reading a potential swipe tag or catcher's movements, move third-baseline extended on the way to an optimal angle and destination as the play unfolds. On a batted ball to the infield and a quick throw to the plate from an infielder, the best starting point is immediately going to third-base-line extended and then work from there. This give the umpire the opportunity to move back to the point of the plate (if necessary) or continue moving beyond third-base-line extended to an optimal angle as the play unfolds.





Taking Plays at First Base (Getting Straight-lined)

Umpires are running to a spot and staying there instead of going to a starting point and READING the throw and how the fielder is going to receive the throw at first base. Umpires need to read the throw and the fielder and make the necessary adjustments so they are not straight-lined at first base. The CCA mechanics committee requires umpires to take plays at first base somewhere between two steps of the foul line and a 90-degree angle. Overrunning angles to get out in front of the mitt to see the exchange is not permitted if it sacrifices the umpire from seeing a potential swipe tag and/or a pulled foot.

Fly Balls

Umpires should generally be stopped to see all catches (even routine catches) unless still striving to get a necessary improved angle. This principle always makes a better umpire when something goes wrong on a seemingly routine catch. "Running through" the catch without a valid reason is not an acceptable practice. The umpire should be set to see the critical action of the play and then may move to improve distance after the play is over to help sell the call.

Plate Umpire Positioning for Pitches

When umpires miss pitches, often they are moving their head and/or body while the pitch is in flight. Umpires sometimes miss a pitch because when they take their final set for the pitch, they may be in position to see the pitcher, but frequently and habitually have the catcher's head between their eyes and home plate. The CCA mechanics committee strongly encourages umpires to work well out into the slot and have their entire body locked in and set as the pitch is delivered.


Starting Position and Umpiring Objective

Umpires are often not in the most ideal position for a play. Usually it is because they are not being held to a standard on achieving the very best position for a play which has to incorporate a well-planned and realistic starting positioning. Umpires should work closer on tag plays in order to stay in the window or slot between runner and fielder on the tag.

















Mechanics for a Crew of Two Umpires









Basic Principles

1. Angle is primary, distance is secondary. While this mechanics manual does not delve into the specifics of where an umpire should take a play, know this: With only two umpires, you're not going to be able to get as close as you'd like on some plays. Work to get a great angle.

2. The plate umpire (PU) will move. Helping on a pulled foot at first base ... helping on slides at second base ... covering plays at third base ... the PU is responsible for much more than balls and strikes.

Balk Concentration

There are some balks that are more obvious from some positions.

PU should concentrate on:

- 1. Left-handed pitchers stepping to the plate.
- 2. Left-handed pitchers coming to a complete stop.
- 3. Right-handed pitchers coming to a complete stop.
- 4. Right-handed pitchers gaining ground on the jump turn.
- 5. Right-handed pitchers closing their front shoulder before the jump turn.
- 6. Right-handed pitchers breaking their front knee before jump turn.







U1 should concentrate on:

- 1. Left-handed pitchers coming to a complete stop.
- 2. Right-handed pitchers breaking their front knees before the jump turn.
- 3. Right-handed pitchers gaining ground on the jump turn.

Note: U1 is no longer responsible for left-handed pitchers stepping to the plate.

Basic Outfield Coverage

- A. Do not go out automatically on all fly balls in your coverage area.
- **B.** Pause and identify. Then go hard and get a good angle. Be stopped when the play occurs.
- **C.** Four conditions that require an umpire to go to the outfield:
 - 1. The outfielder turns and begins to run toward the outfield fence
 - 2. Multiple players converging on a fly ball.
 - 3. A catch being made below the waist.
 - 4. Outfielder moving toward the foul line and possible fair/foul decision.
- **D.** If in doubt, go out on fly balls in your coverage area.
 - 1. If you are going out, go out hard.
 - 2. Leave no doubt in your partners mind about whether or not you are going out.
 - 3. If you are not going out, hold your arm out to your partner with your palm facing him and continue with your responsibilities.
 - 4. Once you go out, do not return until the play is complete.
 - 5. U1 positioned within the infield should never cross the base path to observe catch/no catch.





Overthrows

Overthrow responsibility belongs to the plate umpire with one exception.

If the base umpire (with no runners on) goes to the outfield and then rotates to home, overthrow responsibility will then belong to the base umpire at the plate on all overthrows, except the plate umpire (rotated to third) will have the overthrow at third base that goes toward the outfield.








Initial Positions and Outfield Coverage

NO RUNNERS ON



Umpire responsibilities:

PU: Has center fielder moving toward the left field foul line and any ball hit to the left fielder.

U1: Is in the "A" position. U1 dictates outfield coverage and has the center fielder straight in and straight back and any ball hit to the right fielder.








Infield Catch Coverage

NO RUNNERS ON



Umpire responsibilities:

PU has these catch scenarios:

- 1. The pitcher moving in, left or right.
- 2. The first baseman moving significantly in or right.
- 3. The third baseman in all directions.
- 4. The shortstop moving in, out or toward third base.
- 5. The second baseman moving in or toward second base.

U1 has these catch scenarios:

- 1. Immediately in front of the first baseman, out or toward the foul line.
- 2. The second baseman moving out or toward first base.
- 3. The shortstop moving toward second base.
- 4. The pitcher moving back.








Fair/Foul Coverage

NO RUNNERS ON



Umpire responsibilities:

PU: Has responsibility for balls up to first base and all balls along the third-base line.

U1: Has responsibility for balls that hit first base and/or go beyond.








Plays within the Infield

Action on the field: Ground ball to shortstop, throw to first base

Umpire responsibilities:

PU: Moves toward first base to assist U1 on swipe tag or pulled foot by the first baseman.

U1: Moves into the best position to rule on plays at first base.








Plays within the Infield: Overthrow

NO RUNNERS ON



Action on the field: Ground ball to shortstop, overthrow to first base

Umpire responsibilities:

PU: Observes the ball and rules if it enters dead-ball territory, moving into foul territory as necessary.

U1: Enters the infield and has all plays on the bases.








Clean Hit to the Outfield

Action on the field: A clean hit to the outfield

Umpire responsibilities:

PU: Observes the play.

U1: Enters the infield with a pivot and prepares for all plays on the batter-runner at first base, second base and third base.








Clean Hit to the Outfield: Extra Bases

NO RUNNERS ON



Action on the field: A clean hit to the outfield results in extra bases

Umpire responsibilities:

PU: Observes the play and returns to the plate for any play there.

U1: Enters the infield with a slash and prepares for all plays on the batter-runner at first, second and third base.








Fly Ball to Right Field: No Catch, U1 Goes Out

NO RUNNERS ON



Action on the field: Fly ball to right field, no catch; U1 goes out; the batter-runner advances toward second base

Umpire responsibilities:

PU: Moves to the infield and has all plays on the batter-runner at first, second and third base and home should the runner attempt to score.

U1: Moves into position to best view the catch/no catch. U1 **stays out** but views to observe playing action on infield








Fly Ball to Right Field: Catch, U1 Does Not Go Out

NO RUNNERS ON



Action on the field: A routine fly ball is hit to right field and U1 does not go out

Umpire responsibilities:

PU: Moves to a position to best view the catch/no catch.

U1: Enters the infield and has all plays on the batter-runner at first, second and third base.








Fly Ball to Left Field: No Catch

NO RUNNERS ON



Action on the field: A fly ball to left field, no catch; the batter-runner advances to third

Umpire responsibilities:

PU: Moves to a position to best view the catch/no catch. PU then returns to the plate for all plays there.

U1: Enters the infield and prepares for all plays on the batter-runner at first, second and third base.







Runner on first

Initial Positions and Outfield Coverage

PU: Has the left fielder moving toward the left-field foul line and the right fielder moving toward the right-field foul line.

U1: Starts in the "B" position. U1 has outfield coverage from the left fielder straight in or straight back to the right fielder straight in or straight back. This area is commonly known as the "V."

Infield Catch Coverage

PU has catches:

- 1. By the pitcher moving in, left or right.
- 2. By the third baseman moving back or toward the foul line.
- 3. By the first baseman moving back or toward the foul line.

U1 has catches:

- 1. By the pitcher moving back.
- 2. By the shortstop moving in all directions.
- 3. By the second baseman moving in all directions.
- 4. By the third baseman moving in or toward the middle of the field.
- 5. By the first baseman moving in or toward the middle of the field.

Fair/Foul Coverage

PU: Has responsibility for all balls on both the first- and third-base lines.


U1: Has no fair/foul responsibility





Initial Positions and Outfield Coverage

RUNNER ON 1ST BASE



Umpire responsibilities:

PU: Has the left fielder moving toward the left-field foul line and the right fielder moving toward the right-field foul line. U1: Starts in the "B" position.

U1: has outfield coverage from the left fielder straight in or straight back to the right fielder straight in or straight back.








Infield Catch Coverage

Umpire responsibilities:

PU has catches:

- 1. By the pitcher moving in, left or right.
- 2. By the third baseman moving back or toward the foul line.
- 3. By the first baseman moving back or toward the foul line.

U1 has catches:

- 1. By the pitcher moving back.
- 2. By the shortstop moving in all directions.
- 3. By the second baseman moving in all directions.
- 4. By the third baseman moving in or toward the middle of the field.
- 5. By the first baseman moving in or toward the middle of the field.








Fair/Foul Coverage

Umpire responsibilities:

PU: Has responsibility for all balls on the first- and third-base lines.

U1: Has no fair/foul responsibility.



Action on the field: Double-play ground ball to third base, with a throw to second base followed by a throw to first base.

Umpire responsibilities:

PU: Moves toward the third-base side of the pitcher's mound to assist U1 on the slide at second base by R1. If R1 is out, PU stays with the slide to ensure the slide was legal then turns toward first base for secondary responsibility on a swipe tag and/or pulled foot at first base. If R1 is safe and attempts to advance to third, PU has responsibility for play at third if ball and runner come together. PU is responsible for all plays at home.




